Babcock Mill - Odessa

The Babcock Mill was built in 1856, and in the beginning was made up of a woollen, grist and sawmill operations. The last standing building is The Babcock Mill which has since been restored to a fully functional water-powered mill.

At the end of the 19th century, business owner John Babcock, created a design for a machine that made baskets. He patented this design for basket-making machinery and from then on the Babcock Basket was made.

When did Loyalist Settlement start in Ontario?

Fairfield Homestead - Amherstview

This Homestead, which included the Fairfield House was built by William Fairfield in 1793. Fairfield was one of many civilians who identified as United Empire Loyalists. In the late 1700's, as the American Revolution was causing unrest, the individuals who were loyal to the British crown fled their American homesteads to settle in the area of Picton/Bath/Amherstview.

Fairfield built this homestead in a Colonial style which would have been the same design as his New England roots where he came from.

Old Hay Bay Church - Hay Bay

This beautiful Church is Canada's oldest Methodist building and the second oldest church in all of Ontario. The beautiful building was first built in 1792 and is an example of late 18th Century construction. The Church was the first public meeting space for Ontario's Loyalist community.

The Old Hay Bay Church is a large building that would have been **built by hand** by those who came to make a better life for their family and continue to develop their new country.

Allan Macpherson House, Napanee

This beautiful house can be found along the Napanee River, right in the heart of present day Napanee. Allan Macpherson arrived in Napanee in the early 1800's from Scotland. built this home with wife Mary. Allan was one of the most influential businessmen and founding members of early Napanee. At first he made his mark owning the Grist Mill, but also became the postmaster, justice of the piece, general store owner and much more. He was known as the "Laird (or King) of Napanee for his generosity and business skills.

Nielson Store Museum - Amherst Island

Amherst Island can be reached by ferry, across from Bath. The **Neilson Store Museum** can be found in the small village of Stella. Originally **owned by a grain merchant** – the store is now a Museum and displays many **artifacts from the store's original owner as well as historic boats and local maritime history.**

Amherst Island was inhabited with **United Empire Loyalists** by the end of the 1700's, but was also a
place where **Irish immigrants** were brought. The
lush farmland, access to fishing, and beautiful
landscapes were very appealing for newcomers.
